## Non-Fiction Tips

## A Baker's Dozen...or so

- 1. People remember stories. Write using techniques used in fiction.
- 2. Think of your topic as having 3 parts: the problem, the solution, the application. Assign chapters in each category.
- 3. Use questions, facts, history or humor to create interest.
- 4. Use descriptive words, concrete nouns and active verbs to inject emotion into your writing.
- 5. Define difficult vocabulary; use short sentences and easy vocabulary.
- 6. Use surprise to keep the reader's attention.
- 7. Outline your idea by creating a Table of Contents and writing chapter summaries. Analyze them for cohesion and completeness.
- 8. Research other books on your topic and find something missing. This is your unique angle to make your book standout.
- 9. Identify your reader and write to them.
- 10. Eliminate unnecessary words.
- 11. Fact check; fact check; fact check!

- 12. Establish your credibility with a social media following, blog, guest posts, teaching position, interviews, magazine articles, etc.
- 13. Interview people about your topic to learn what they need.
- 14. Gain feedback by employing beta readers. Adjust book accordingly if need be.
